Recommendation

THAT Council share the \$30,000 budget allocation equally across the four (4) recognised local Show Societies as follows:

- 1. \$7,500 funding to Stanthorpe Agricultural Society & Show Committee for the 2025 Stanthorpe Show;
- 2. \$7,500 to the Warwick Show & Rodeo Society Inc. for the 2025 Warwick Show;
- 3. \$7,500 to the Allora Show Society Inc. for the 2025 Allora Show; and
- 4. \$7,500 to the Killarney Show & Rodeo Society Inc. for the 2025 Killarney Show;

with the funding to be used and acquitted by the Societies for the 2025 agricultural shows held across the Southern Downs.

REPORT

Background

The Southern Downs Regional Council approved \$30,000 in the 2024/25 budget to be shared across the four (4) eligible Show Societies and Committees that hold Agricultural Shows in the Southern Downs. The budget initiative aims to support and enhance community events, infrastructure, and activities that provide a broad benefit to communities across the Southern Downs Region.

The Show Societies eligible included:

- Stanthorpe Agricultural Society & Show Committee
- Warwick Show & Rodeo Society Inc.
- Allora Show Society Inc.
- Killarney Show & Rodeo Society Inc.

Report

On 29 November 2024, Council wrote to the Show Societies inviting them to participate in an Expression of Interest (EOI) process. To be eligible, the Show Societies were required to submit to Council by close of business (COB) on 13 December 2024 the following:

Amount Requested: Specify the amount of funding you are applying for;

- 2. **Purpose of Funding**: Provide a detailed description of how the funds will be used and the anticipated outcomes;
- 3. **Membership and Staffing Details**: Indicate whether your organisation operates with paid staff, volunteers, or a combination of both; and
- 4. **Audited Financial Statement**: Attach a copy of your organisation's audited financial statement for the most recent financial year.

Of the four (4) applications received by COB Friday 13 December 2024, all met the criteria as defined above.

The total funding requested for the four (4) Applications equates to \$30,380, which is \$380 above the budget amount.

Conclusion/Summary

It is recommended that the four (4) applications received in December 2024 from Stanthorpe Agricultural Society & Show Committee, Warwick Show & Rodeo Society Inc, Allora Show Society Inc. for the 2025 Allora Show; and Killarney Show & Rodeo Society Inc. be equally funded \$7,500 for a total of \$30,000.

RE: 2024-25 Show Funding Application – Allora Show Society Inc

This correspondence is in application for Council's 2024-2025 Show Societies and Committees funding opportunity. The Allora Show Society would be grateful to apply for \$7500 to be spent on additional entertainment for children at the 2025 Allora Annual Show Event. This funding would result in a wider range of quality entertainment for the children of our community attending the Show.

The Allora Show Society currently has 394 number of members and anticipate approximately 2000 gate entries based on the previous 2024 Show. We operate primarily on a volunteer basis with only two paid staff being for administration/bookkeeping and caretaking.

This funding would be used towards the full payment of one source of entertainment with the balance going towards a second source. We aim to provide entertainment for ages ranging from very young children to teenagers. Two suitable sources of entertainment have been found. One is Melville's Entertainment for two days including a range of entertainment. A baby animal nursery and a separate larger animal display of unique animals. Chicken lotto for the first 100 people through the gate and a duck racing event. The cost for Melville's Entertainment is \$5000 plus GST. The other source of entertainment is Randy's Junkyard with three half hour stunt shows performed throughout the day. The cost for Randy's Junkyard is \$5000 plus GST.

Application for funding for show societies and committees

I am writing to you in response to correspondence we received on 29 November in relation to funding that may be available for show societies and committees.

THE STANTHORPE SHOW

We are seeking \$7,500.00 funding to assist the Stanthorpe Agricultural Society (the Society) in hosting the one community event that brings every aspect of every community together every year, the annual agricultural show, and in this case the 2025 Stanthorpe Agricultural Show.

The 2025 Stanthorpe Agricultural Show is a large community event that almost half the Stanthorpe and wider Granite Belt community attend. The SDRC community grants funding program is focused on providing support to large scale community projects and events, and the Stanthorpe Agricultural Society would welcome the opportunity to partner with SDRC for this event.

Stanthorpe has the proud honour of being the first agricultural show for the Queensland show year. Every year, all eyes are up on us to see what's new i.e. what innovations or innovative displays we might bring in this year, what entertainment we provide our supportive patrons, how we entertain the kids, what support we have received from the business community and how we manage to attract the wealth of volunteers who make our show possible. We already enjoy the reputation of having one of the most diverse agricultural shows in Queensland, with over 45 different sections or activities taking place in one community event.

DATES

In 2025, the start date for the Stanthorpe Show is Friday 31 January 2025 and the end date is Sunday 2 February 2025.

PURPOSE OF FUNDING

We are seeking funds to bring quality entertainment to the 2025 Stanthorpe Agricultural Show which will support community engagement and socialising, excitement and wonder, and enhance the show experience for approx. 4500 patrons.

Providing quality entertainment at the 2025 Stanthorpe Show will benefit our patrons who come from all demographics by:

- providing a fun and exciting atmosphere at the show
- engaging with the community through listening, singing, dancing, photographing, etc
- reflecting the values of the Society showing investment in our community wellbeing
- providing opportunities to relax and network
- providing opportunities to strengthen friendships and relationships
- ensuring patrons have good experiences at the show and take home lasting memories.

Providing quality entertainment at the 2025 Stanthorpe Show will showcase the level of investment the Society is prepared to undergo for our show, and this will attract increased patronage and sponsorship from local businesses. Increased brand exposure from local businesses will, in turn, increase patronage for their business and contribute to the \$1million economic benefit that the annual Stanthorpe Show realises for our community.

PARTICIPATION


Estimated community participation at the Stanthorpe Show comprises:

- An average of 4500 people will attend the 2025 Stanthorpe Show.
- Approx. 1500 people will become members of the Stanthorpe Agricultural Society in the lead up to the show.
- Approx. 200 sponsors providing cash, trophies and prize money.
- Approx. 500 competitors compete at the 2025 Stanthorpe Show.
- Approx. 200 volunteers volunteer at the 2025 Stanthorpe Show.
- Approx. 50 contractors are engaged throughout the 2025 Stanthorpe Show.
- Approx. 50 other community groups partner with the Society to host the 2025 Stanthorpe Show.
- Social media analytics demonstrate that we should anticipate:
 - Approx. 7,000 total website sessions.
 - o Approx. 5000 unique visitors
 - o Reaching approx. 15,000 people who view facebook posts

Community participation is also demonstrated by the fact that as soon as each one of the Granite Belt's 15 schools open at the beginning of the year, the first thing they do is create exhibits to enter into the Stanthorpe Agricultural Show. These exhibits include school art, fine art, clay and pottery, manual arts, horticulture and floral art, ingenious sheep artwork, etc. This commitment by our local schools gets the kids and their families talking about the show, and of course, encourages them to attend the show to see their entries.

Over the past nine years, gate figures demonstrate the high level of community support for the Stanthorpe Agricultural Show:



BENEFITS

The Stanthorpe, and wider Granite Belt community, will benefit from the show as follows:

- 1) The show provides the opportunity for individuals, families and other groups to connect with each other, network, support, and socialise in a fun, family and entertaining forum.
- 2) All demographics, abilities, ages etc can come and enjoy their annual local show.
- 3) The show contributes to the economic and social fabric of our local community.
- 4) The Granite Belt's local industries have an opportunity to showcase the best of what they produce in our region.
- 5) Business houses, local industries and the commercial sector benefit from the publicity that comes with sponsorship, relationships are strengthened and long term support encouraged.
- 6) The Stanthorpe Agricultural Society benefits from raising funds from the show to assist managing the Stanthorpe Showgrounds for the community for the balance of the year.
- 7) Groups such as LIONS, St Josephs School P&C, Stanthorpe State High School, Stanthorpe SES and Rotary all benefit directly through successfully tendering to run bars, gates and parking at the show.
- 8) Local rural bushfire brigades and urban brigades benefit from the exposure to the community to talk about fire awareness and planning, undertake some fundraising and show off the fire engines to the kids.
- 9) Volunteers benefit from that sense of inclusion or contribution assisting in ensuring a section is run well, answering questions from the public about their commodity or activity, promoting volunteerism and attracting more volunteers for subsequent events.

THE SOCIETY

The Stanthorpe Agricultural Society is an incorporated association established in 1875. At the time the *Religious Educational and Charitable Institutions Act of 1861* was assented to on August 13, 1861 and enabled the Executive Council to issue Letters Patent to religious, educational and charitable groups. Organizations registered under this Act were able to manage estates, properties and effects, receive and purchase property, borrow and lend money, sue and be sued, invest money, purchase and trade shares, inherit money or goods from an estate provided that the deed of grant was made at least one month prior to the person's death in the presence of three credible witnesses.

The provisions of the Act were later expanded through a series of amendments and in 1959 Agricultural Shows were also able to register under this Act. Organizations registered had to file proof of succession with the Supreme Court Registrar and the files can include documents such as correspondence, affadivits as to the identity of those elected to management positions and an organization's constitution.

This Act was repealed and replaced by the "Associations Incorporation Act 1981" which became responsible for registering all new incorporations. The letters patent issued to the Stanthorpe Agricultural Society under the previous act retained its legal standing making the Society eligible to apply for grant funding similar to incorporated associations.

STRUCTURE

The Society currently operates under a structure that includes:

- 4 paid personnel (caretaker, secretary, groundsman and bookkeeper).
- A general committee of 15 volunteers (including an executive of 6 volunteers).
- 30+ sections and smaller subcommittees who come together to host the annual show.
- 6 larger subcommittees who manage events in additional to the show.
- A volunteer base of over 200 volunteers.
- A membership base of over 1300 members.

We hope that this is all the information you need and please contact us if you require anything further.

Please pass on our thanks to those within the Southern Downs Regional Council who were involved in making this show funding available to the four show societies in the Southern Downs. We commend council on this initiative and look forward to further opportunities for apply for further funding in the future.

This is seen with exhibits throughout the pavilion & around the grounds, whether it be needlework, horticulture, cattle, horses, poultry, sheep or other displays, these proudly show the talents of our local people. With many trying times due to drought, flood, covid 19 pandemic & other unforeseen circumstances, the Warwick Show & Rodeo Society has maintained trying their best to continue to provide awareness & showcase what is available in our local area at the show.

Amount Requested - \$7500 (With \$30,000 available, I feel that with the trying times we all have with preparing for our individual shows, it would only be fair to have funding available for the other 3 Shows in our region as well & as such I would like to apply for a portion of the available amount to allow the other show societies an equal opportunity to apply for funding also). D'Aguilar Wildlife - \$7908.56

D'Aguilar Wildlife is the only display of its kind in Australia, being a mobile experience that allows you to get up close to a range of Australian Wildlife that can include Koalas, Native Reptiles, Mammals & Birds. It is a walk-through display & also includes 3 interactive sessions daily providing education & awareness around Australian Wildlife, inside a covered, secure area. It is an all-weather display & can have up to 50 guests at a time.

This display was a crowd favourite at the 2024 show, bringing awareness of our Australian Wildlife while also providing an up-close experience that some of our guests at the show may not have been exposed to before.

Fireworks - \$4400.00

Fireworks has always been a crowd pleaser for both young & the young at heart during the Friday evening entertainment at the Warwick Show & we would like to see that continue in 2025. We are still waiting on a quote for 2025 for the fireworks to be sent from the company, however we have got the invoice from this years show & have been advised that it will be at a very similar price again next year

Membership & Staffing - The Warwick Show & Rodeo Society currently has 2 paid employees, 1 being part time & 1 being fulltime (currently on extended leave), along with numerous volunteers who dedicate a lot of their time & work tirelessly to bring events together including the Show.

Audited Financial Statement — Attached is a copy of our previous financial statement along with a letter from our society accountant that states our most recent audited financial report has not been finalised as of yet.

I would like to once again thank the Southern Downs Regional Council for this opportunity of funding for our region's upcoming 2025 shows.


